CONTROVERSIAL LAND USE AT HASTINGS

UC HASTINGS ALUMNI! Contact Hastings, the Law School that Ate the Tenderloin, to oppose the garage!

UC Hastings plans to build an 885 space-parking garage on the lot it owns at the corner of Golden Gate and Larkin. A wide range of community groups, such as the St. Anthony Foundation, Sierra Club and the Tenderloin Housing Clinic want Hastings to include housing and reduce the number of parking spaces because homes for people, not cars, would better serve the community and Hastings. Hastings is exempted from local zoning ordinances as a state agency.

Although Hastings began developing the proposal two to three years ago and has an agreement with the State to provide 300 parking spaces for employees at the State Office Building located across the street from the site, Hastings first announced its intent to build the parking garage last November. The administration at Hastings informed the student body by burying the news within a three-page memo distributed during the winter break, although every chance it gets Hastings claims to build the garage for the students.

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) released by Hastings to comply with the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act inadequately considers alternatives and uses unreasonable assumptions to conclude that the garage will cause no significant impacts, freeing it from a legal obligation to mitigate those impacts. As both project sponsor and lead agency, Hastings has the legal authority to identify and evaluate the environmental impacts of the proposed garage, and then certify those results without ever submitting them to another agency for approval.

The DEIR does not consider mixed use alternatives, like eliminating parking spaces to make room for housing units, which have been shown to work and generate more revenue than would the proposed parking garage. The only alternative the DEIR considers, other than not building the garage, is removing the elevator equipment apparatus, which reduces the height of the garage from 107 feet to 80 feet. I call this "with the party hat" or "without the party hat" because it is superficial and an alternative in name only.

The DEIR also laughably asserts that only people already driving will park at the proposed garage, shifting from where they park now, and that 885 new parking spaces in downtown San Francisco will not cause a single person to start driving. If Hastings assumption were true, the parking lot that would most likely lose business would be the Civic Center underground garage, revenues from which go into the San Francisco General Fund.

Hastings has not considered or is simply indifferent to the impact of the garage on the Tenderloin. Many individuals at a public comment hearing on March 6 stated that the lack of foot traffic on the streets around the garage will create an environment in which crime can flourish. Others stated that the garage and the influx of automobile traffic will increase the pedestrian death rate in the Tenderloin, the second highest in San Francisco, especially in light of the many

NLG POST SEPT. 11TH WORK CONTINUES

As the government continues on its mission to wage war on dissent, condone the most recent wave of racial profiling, hold prisoners *incommunicado* both domestically and in Guantanamo, set up military tribunals, conduct an illegal war in Afghanistan and threaten more, and nuclear, wars, the Guild is also planning for a long struggle.

On the afternoon of September 11th, 20 people met in the Guild office to discuss plans for the new period; 10 activists and 10 Guild attorneys. The activists had called us immediately, said they feared a backlash on them, and asked what support the NLG could offer. That was the birth of the *Know Your Rights* brochure, which has been translated into Spanish, Farsi, Arabic and Portuguese, (available at www.nlg.org), with over 60,000 distributed in the Bay Area and South Bay alone. In addition, the Guild's 24-hour hotline was established, and continues today.

Two hotline calls have received national press coverage: the woman who was contacted by the FBI and threatened with a Grand Jury subpoena because of her work with Women in Black (which silently protests the treatment of Palestinians), and the man who was visited by the FBI after talking at his health club about the war, oil and bombing. A recent call was from a man who was being held in INS detention. We provided an attorney to represent him at his bond hearing. The judge granted reduced bond, the INS attorney didn't object, then an INS agent said he could not be released because he was from Pakistan. We called a reporter from the San Jose Mercury news, and an hour after he called the INS, the man was released.

The Chapter has held an MCLE for criminal defense attorneys about political grand juries, and an MCLE for immigration attorneys about bond, detention and deportation issues. We were recently approached by a member of Filipinos for Affirmative Action, which is organizing with the airport security workers who will lose their jobs because of their lack of citizenship. She asked for help with the increase of wrongful discharge cases stemming from the racism that September 11th has unleashed. We are looking for labor and employment attorneys who are interested in helping. We have also established a speaker's bureau which averages about two engagements a week, addressing the domestic consequences of September 11th.

LAW STUDENT ORGANIZER JOB OPEN

The Law Student Organizer (LSO) works under the supervision of the Executive Committee of the San Francisco/Bay Area NLG to coordinate activities and organize law students among the Bay Area NLG student chapters. senior citizens who call the Tenderloin their home.

Finally, Hastings has an obligation to replace the housing it destroyed when it demolished two residential hotels that formerly stood on the site. Hastings claimed that the 1989 earthquake damaged the buildings beyond repair but independent evaluations disputed that conclusion. Hastings now claims that providing housing to the general public does not conform with its educational mission. Conveniently for Hastings, providing parking to the general public does conform with its educational mission.

Hastings will publish the final Environmental Impact Report for the garage on April 12, 2002 but does not plan to begin construction until August. Randy Shaw, Executive Director of the Tenderloin Housing Clinic, has stated that if Hastings continues with its plan, it will be seen as a "declaration of war" against the community. Father Kelly, of the Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corp. has declared that people "will be standing in front of the bulldozers, should they appear."

Everyone, and especially concerned Hastings alumni, should contact the UC Hastings Board of Directors to inform the Board that their current proposal is unreasonable and should be scrapped, and that a revised proposal for the site should honestly consider the impact upon the Tenderloin and San Francisco and the actual needs of the student.

Post 911 Work , con't from front

With all this consistent work beginning immediately following the event, the Chapter was able to obtain funding to hire part-time staff to do Post 9-11 work.

The Guild National Executive Committee (NEC) decided at our annual convention in Tuscon last October to launch a national NLG Post 9-11 Project based in NYC. The national office is moving, so at the February NEC meeting, it was decided to move the national Post 9-11 Project to San Francisco (pending our board approval, which was given) for three months until the national office is established in its new office location. Thus, we have funding for a full time staff person for three months, who will develop both local and national post 9-11 work. After the national project moves back to NY, we intend to obtain funding to continue the local organizing work. A person has been hired and will begin next week.

National work will include developing Guild contacts around the country and facilitating their organizing efforts by sending out Know Your Rights brochures and CD's, speakers bureau materials, and press releases for local media work. The chapter work will include overseeing the hotline and speakers bureau, helping with more local outreach into impacted communities, holding student visa clinics at local colleges with large a large foreign student enrollment, and working with local coalitions.

JUVENILE JUSTICE TASK FORCE

San Francisco Supervisor Matt Gonzalez recently established a Juvenile Justice Task Force, which will study how the City spends its money on juvenile justice, and how it can improve the allocation of City resources. He requested that Program Director Riva Enteen hold one of the three seats on this six-month task force because of her five years' experience doing budget advocacy through the People's Budget. Guild member Whitney Leigh was also appointed to the Task Force. The Chapter is forming a committee of people interested in working on juvenile justice issues, particularly people who have experience with the system and ideas for how services can be improved. EARTH FIRST! VS THE FBI & OPD; HISTORIC LAWSUIT BEGINS APRIL 8TH

On May 24, 1990, Earth First! organizers Darryl Cherney and Judi Bari were the victims of a motion triggered car bomb as they drove through Oakland on a tour to promote Redwood Summer, a nonviolent direct action campaign opposed to logging the last old growth redwoods. The FBI and Oakland Police showed up at the bomb scene within minutes and quickly arrested the pair for transporting the bomb, despite ample evidence that Judi was the intended target. The Alameda County DA eventually refused to press charges against the pair due to lack of evidence. No real investigation to find the bombers was ever done and the bombers remain at large today. Instead the FBI used the bombing as an opportunity to vilify Earth First! and expand surveillance of nonviolent environmentalists.

In 1991, Judi and Darryl filed a civil rights lawsuit against the FBI and Oakland Police Department for false arrest, illegal search and seizure and conspiracy to violate their first amendment rights. The lawsuit is exposing the FBI's continued use of the notorious and now illegal "COINTELPRO" program- the FBI campaign to, in their words, "disrupt and neutralize" political dissidents. Judi died of breast cancer in 1997 but the case survives and is scheduled for trial April 8, 2002 at the Oakland Federal Courthouse.

HOMEBOY/KABUL By Tony Kushner

"Ours is a time of connection; the private, and we must accept this, the private is gone. All must be touched. All touch corrupts. All must be corrupted." from *The Homebody*

The *Homebody*, a bored, emotionally imprisoned but wildly intellectual English woman, finds refuge and escape in the alternate world of Afghanistan, which she romanticizes with the help of a tourist guidebook. Her mysterious disappearance in Afghanistan prompts an ensuing search by her husband and daughter who arrive in the foreign land unprepared for the adventures and contradictions that await them.

In their quest for truth and closure, the lines between the real and the unreal, the political and the personal, the public and the private, the psychological and the sociological, are intentionally blurred and artfully ambiguous. As in his previous work (*Angels In America*, *Hydriotaphia, Slavs!*), Tony Kushner's ability to provoke, entertain, reinvent and reconstitute language is astonishing; with *Homebody/Kabul*, Kushner reaffirms his status as one of the most important and dynamic contemporary dramatists in the world.

CENTER FOR YOUTH DEVELOPMENT THROUGH LAW

Low income youth of color in our community experience oppressive attitudes and policies on a daily basis. TAKE ACTION! PROTEST THE NOMINATION OF BUSH AND BLAIR FOR NOBEL PEACE PRIZE

They say that satire died when Henry Kissinger was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize, but if a Right-wing Norwegian MP has his way, the Nobel committee will be spitting on its grave.

Harald Tom Nesvik, a member of the Norwegian Parliament from the Right-wing Party of Progress, has nominated U.K. Prime Minister Tony Blair and U.S. President George W. Bush for the Nobel Peace Prize for "decisive action against terrorism, something I believe in the future will be the greatest threat to peace." According to the provisions of Nobel, the winner of the Nobel Peace Prize "shall have done the most for the best work for fraternity between nations, for the abolition or reduction of standing armies and for the holding and promotion of peace congresses."

Urge the Nobel Institute to reject the nomination of Tony Blair and George W. Bush. Reckless and ever-expanding pursuit of war is not peace, and awarding the Peace Prize for massive world-wide military campaigns would be a slap in the face of peace and justice activists world wide.
